RSE Policy

School Mission Statement;

Our school is a community of learning in an environment of respect and commitment. All who live in our area are welcome to participate in our learning experience in an atmosphere of concern and openness.

RSE (Relationships and Sexuality Education) is a module in the overall framework of the SPHE programme.

Aims and Objectives of RSE

Aims

- 1. To develop a positive sense of self-awareness and skills needed for building and maintaining self-esteem.
- 2. To help young people understand and develop friendships and relationships.
- 3. To promote an understanding of sexuality.
- 4. To promote a positive attitude towards one's own sexuality and in one's relationships with others.
- 5. To promote knowledge of and respect for reproduction.
- 6. To enable young people to develop attitudes and values towards their sexuality in a moral, spiritual and social framework.

Objectives

RSE should enable students to;

- 1. Acquire the understanding and skills necessary to form healthy friendships and relationships.
- 2. Become aware of the variety of ways in which individuals grow and change, especially during adolescence, and to develop respect for difference between individuals.
- 3. Understand human physiology with particular reference to the reproductive cycle, human fertility and STI's.
- 4. Understand sexual development and identity and explore aspects of sexuality including sex roles, stereotyping, gender issues and cultural influences on sexuality.
- 5. Value family life and appreciate the responsibilities of parenthood.
- 6. Develop strategies for decisions and actions consistent with personal moral integrity and respectful of the rights and dignity of others.
- 7. Develop skills for coping with peer pressure, conflict and threats to personal safety.

Time allocation, Structure and Timetabling of RSE

At Junior cycle, RSE is provided as a modular programme within the SPHE programme and is facilitated during SPHE class time from 1st year to 3rd year. There is a single class period per week and classes are 35 – 40 minutes long. At Junior cycle, SPHE is generally delivered by the Class Tutors, to encourage trust and develop regular open forums for discussion. At Senior cycle, RSE is delivered through a module in Religion class. There are two RE classes per week in Transition year and three classes per week in 5th and 6th year. Students at senior cycle rotate teachers every 8-10 weeks. RSE is delivered to Leaving Cert Applied students through Social Education in LCA years 1 and 2.

Programme Outline

There are three core themes in the RSE programme; *Human Growth and Development, Human Sexuality and Human Relationships.*

Topics for **Junior Cycle** students will include:

1. Human Growth and Development

- ❖ An understanding of physical and emotional changes at puberty.
- ❖ Fertility, conception, pregnancy and birth, sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV and AIDS.
- An awareness of the consequences and implications of sexuality activity.

2. Human Sexuality

- ❖ Understanding and respecting what it is to be male or female.
- ❖ An appreciation of the roles of women and men in society.
- ❖ Awareness of discrimination.
- Personal safety.
- Sexual orientation.

3. Human Relationships

- Developing skills regarding making and maintaining good relationships and friendships.
- Family roles and responsibilities.
- Group behaviour and resolving conflict.
- ❖ An understanding of how peer pressure works.

Topics for <u>Senior Cycle</u> students will build on elements covered in Junior cycle and will treat issues in ways suitable for the young adult:

1. Human Growth and Development

- ❖ Fertility and family planning.
- ❖ A deeper understanding of pregnancy and the developing foetus.
- ❖ Human Health Breast, cervical, testicular and lung cancer.

2. Human Sexuality

- * Treating women and men with equal respect.
- ❖ Sexual harassment.
- ❖ Sexual abuse, rape, legal rights; voluntary and statutory agencies.
- ❖ Making moral and healthy choices regarding sexual activity.
- Sexual orientation and Gender Identity.

3. Human Relationships

- ❖ An awareness of what constitutes a loving healthy relationship.
- ❖ The long term commitment involved in marriage/civil partnerships.
- Parenting and family life.
- Prejudice and discrimination.

Teaching and Learning Strategies
